



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About Aruba

OUR HAPPY ISLAND

Aruba is located in the heart of the southern Caribbean. 15 miles from the South American coastline. The island is 19.6 miles long, and six miles across at its widest point, with a total area of 70 square miles.

Aruba's topography and vegetation are unusual for a Caribbean island. On the south and west coasts are miles of pristine white beaches that rank among the most beautiful in the world, rimmed by calm blue seas with visibility in some areas to a depth of a hundred feet. The northeast coast, along the windward shore, is rugged and wild. The interior is desertlike, with a variety of cacti and dramatic rock formations. The island's most famous trees are the watapana, or divi-divi trees, all permanently sculpted into graceful, southwest-bending shapes by the constant trade winds.

It's always summer in Aruba, and almost always dry. The average daytime temperature is 82° F. The difference between median day and night temperatures, and between summer and winter temperatures, is just 3.6° F. The average rainfall is less than 20 inches a year, occurring mainly in short showers during November and December. Aruba is located safely away from the traditional path of hurricanes. Just one word of caution: The sun is at its strongest between 11am and 2:30pm, and the use of protective sun lotions, including locally made products such as Aruba Aloe, is highly recommended.


OUR FRIENDLY PEOPLE

There are about 100,000 full-time inhabitants on Aruba, representing more than 40 different nationalities, living

peacefully together on Aruba. Hospitality remains a strongly ingrained tradition amongst the population.

The official languages of Aruba are Dutch as well as the native tongue of Papiamento, but most Arubans are fluent in several languages, including English and Spanish. The local Papiamento, a lilting, melodic language, has evolved over the centuries from an eclectic mixture of Spanish, Dutch and Portuguese with a sprinkling of Indian, English and French.

The schools of Aruba are subject to the same high standards applied to educational institutions in the Netherlands. Some 14.9 percent of the island's budget is devoted to education, resulting in a high level of education for the island's inhabitants.



Higher education goals are sought abroad or through local educational institutions that include a teacher's college, a law school, various technical and training establishments, and special-purpose schools such as the Aruba Hotel School.

OUR SYSTEM OF GOVERNMENT

On January 1, 1986, Aruba became a separate entity within the Kingdom of the Netherlands. With this new "Status Aparte," the Kingdom of the Netherlands now has three separate components: the Netherlands, the Netherlands Antilles, and Aruba. The government of the Kingdom of the Netherlands is still responsible for the defense and foreign affairs of the entire kingdom.

The system of government in Aruba is based on western democratic principles. The Governor is appointed by the Queen of the Dutch Kingdom for a term of six years and acts as the sovereign's representative on the island. The legislature consists of a 21-member Parliament elected by popular vote. The Council of Ministers, presided over by the Prime Minister, forms the executive power. Legal jurisdiction lies with a Common Court of Justice of Aruba and the Netherlands Antilles and a Supreme Court of Justice in the Netherlands.

ARUBA AS A VACATION DESTINATION

Aruba welcomes visitors from all over the world. Of the over 600,000 stay-over guests that choose to come to our island annually, the majority are traveling from the United States, with numerous guests also visiting from Latin America and Europe.

WHEN TO VISIT

There is no wrong time to visit Aruba. Cooling trade winds help to keep temperatures consistently mild. There is no rainy season, the island lies away from the hurricane path, and the sea temperature hovers around 82° F all year long.

January, February and March are the most popular times to visit. During Carnival, just before Lent, the island is hopping with parades, festivities and parties. If you prefer smaller crowds and a more relaxed atmosphere, plan your trip for mid-April through September. Or, if you can't stand another morning of scraping ice from your windshield, hop the next plane and come in the middle of December. In other words, choose your own time. Come just because you feel like it. Whenever you feel like it.





Ports of Entry

QUEEN BEATRIX INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT

Aruba's state-of-the-art airport facility is the result of a multi-million dollar renovation and expansion project that has established the Queen Beatrix International Airport as a hub in the Caribbean. The island is served by a number of airlines, and connections can be made to any part of the world. U.S.-bound passengers benefit from their own terminal building that houses a U.S. INS/ Customs facility, allowing flights from Aruba to enter the U.S. as domestic flights.

The island is also a popular port of call. Each year about 500,000 cruise ship passengers disembark in Aruba.

Aruba is also served by charter flights from Boston, Chicago, and Detroit through companies including GWV, TNT Vacations, Apple Vacations, and Funjet Vacations.

In Canada, scheduled service from Montreal and Toronto is offered by Air Canada, American Airlines via Miami, Delta Airlines via Atlanta, US Airways via Philadelphia or Continental via Houston. Charter service is available through Air Canada, Sunquest and Signature Vacations.

From Brazil, scheduled service is offered through Varig Airlines, from Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paolo.

European charters include First Choice from the U.K., departing from London-Gatwick.

ARUBA CRUISE TERMINAL

Thousands of cruise ship passengers disembark at the Oranjestad port each week, with tourism representatives and activity companies ready to greet their arrival and help introduce them to Aruba's many pleasures.

Cruise tourism to Aruba started in the early fifties with the visit of the m.s. Libertador, a combination cargo/passenger ship belonging to the K.N.S.M. (Royal Netherlands Steamship Company, now the Nedlloyd Line). Regular visits by passenger ships, begun in 1958, have been steadily increasing ever since. Aruba is now on the itinerary of most cruise lines serving the Caribbean.



The height of the cruise tourism season runs October through April, however, numerous big ships and mega-liners visit the island year-round. Cruise lines including Holland America Line, Princess Cruises and the Royal Caribbean Cruise Line Celebrity Cruises and Carnival Cruises already make regular stops in Aruba, with the island prepared to greet yet more of the big ships with renovation and beautification plans scheduled for the port by the Aruba Ports Authority and the Cruise Tourism Authority. Entry Requirements

All Aruba visitors must submit a valid travel document, which must be valid at least more than three (3) months, than the return travel date mentioned on the visitor's ticket as well as other documentation. For definition of a valid travel document and a complete list of the additional required documentation, please go to www.aruba.com and click on Entry Requirements.

The U.S. State Department and the Department of Homeland Security recently announced the Western Hemisphere Travel Initiative, which will require all U.S. citizens and foreign nationals, to carry a passport and other accepted secure documents to enter or re-enter the U.S. from vacations or business travel anywhere in the Caribbean effective January 23, 2007. This requirement is applied to all air travel and will also be applicable for all sea travel as of January 1, 2008. Please note that travel insurance is presently being considered as a requirement. Please visit www.aruba.com regularly for updates on travel insurance. It is in any case highly recommended to buy travel insurance when traveling anywhere.

Some countries require a visa to enter Aruba, please go to www.aruba.com for a complete list of the visa and nonvisa required countries. ARUBA CUSTOMS

Besides articles for personal use, persons over 18 are allowed one fifth of liquor and 200 cigarettes, 50 cigars, 250 grams of tobacco. Aruba abides by CITES regulations in monitoring against the international trade in endangered species. Products, for example, made from sea turtles or conch shells, are prohibited from being brought into or out of the country.

U.S. PRE-CLEARANCE IN ARUBA

Aruba is only one of three Caribbean destinations that provides for U.S. pre-clearance services, allowing flights from Aruba to enter the United states as domestic flights. The Department of Homeland Security merged the three Federal agencies (U.S. Customs, U.S. Immigration and U.S. Agriculture) into one agency: Customs and Border Protection (CBP). CBP is responsible for each specific mission of the three former agencies. The advantage of this merger is that passengers now, for the most part, have only one stop during the inspection process. Some passengers, however, may have to pay duty, report currency, or have their bags or documents inspected, which will require a second stop. Some specific areas of responsibility are:

CBP is responsible for admitting persons, as well as foreign articles, into the United States. U.S. citizens must present a valid passport, or a birth certificate and picture ID to verify proof of citizenship. Several countries are on the "visa waiver" program. U.S. visitors with visas must participate in the U.S. VISITS program, unless specifically exempt (diplomas, children 13 and under, adults 80 and over). U.S. VISITS requires CBP officers to collect fingerprints and pictures of the visa holder. Both are done electronically and take approximately 1 minute to process. In October 2004, participants in the visa waiver program will be required to participate in the U.S. VISITS program. Direct questions concerning documents you will need prior to entering the United States to CBP officers at (297) 583-1316.

All articles acquired in a foreign country must be declared to a CBP officer. These articles include anything that was

purchased or given to the individual as gifts. U.S. residents may acquire up to \$600 worth of merchandise without paying duty. If a resident acquires more than \$600 worth of merchandise, the next \$1,000 is dutiable at 3% of the value. Anything over \$1600 is subject to duties at various rates depending on the article. Included in the \$600 can be the value of 2 liters of alcohol (provided the resident is 21 years of age); one carton of cigarettes and 50 cigars. Cuban products (including cigars) are prohibited from entering the United States. Direct questions concerning merchandise to CBP officers at (297) 588-7240.

CBP is also responsible for food and plant products entering the United States. Because of diseases in other parts of the world that are not in the United States, CBP inspects meats, fresh fruits, vegetables, other food and fresh plant products carried by travelers. Most travelers will be required to throw away any plant and many food products prior to entering the gate area at the Queen Beatrix Airport. U.S. Passport Requirements:

The U.S. State Department and the Department of Homeland Security recently announced the Western Hemisphere Travel Initiative, which will require all U.S. citizens and foreign nationals, to carry a passport or other accepted secure documents to enter or re-enter the U.S. from vacations or business travel anywhere in the Caribbean effective January 23, 2007. This requirement is applied to all air and sea travel. For more information on the new U.S. passport initiative, please visit www.travel.state.gov

CANADA CUSTOMS

After 24 hours absence or more (any number of times per year), you may bring in goods to the value of \$50 (except tobacco products and alcoholic beverages). A written declaration may be required. After 48 hours absence or more (any number of times per year), you may bring in goods to the value of \$200. A written declaration may be required. After 7 days absence or more (one every calendar year), you may bring in goods to the value of \$750. A written declaration will be required.

Any person aged 16 or over may include up to 200 cigarettes, 50 cigars or 200 grams of tobacco. Of course, the dollar value of these goods forms part of your personal exemption. If you meet the age requirements set by the province or territory through which you re-enter Canada, you may include up to 1.5 liters of wine, 40 oz. of liquor or 24 cans of beer. Original works of art valued at \$20 or more are duty free.



Attractions

The attractions of Aruba extend well beyond the beaches. There are the coves of Andicuri and Dos Playa. The quaint countryside houses and the colorful birds at Frenchman's Pass. The chapel of Alto Vista. The graves of early settlers at Seroe Patrishi. Fort Zoutman, the old Protestant church, and the ornate, hand-carved neo-Gothic altar in the church of Santa Anna at Noord.

On the wild side are the old California lighthouse and the sand dunes of California and Boca Prins. The Natural Bridge our number one tourist attraction before it collapsed in August 2005. Visitors can still enjoy the Baby Natural Bridge right next to it. The grotto of Guadirikiri. The gold-mill ruins at Bushiribana and Balashi. The rock formations of Ayo and Casibari. The painted Indian petrographs in the cave at Fontein, on the rocks of Arikok National Park, and elsewhere.

NATURALIST PURSUITS

ARIKOK NATIONAL PARK

A day of discovery is as easy as a walk in the park, with the island's Arikok National Park providing a glimpse into the island's past and enjoyment of its natural beauty.

A rich blend of colors and textures are found in the awesome features of Aruba's untouched landscapes. The azure blue of the Caribbean Sea at the horizon is thrown in contrast to the rolling green of cactus-studded hills, the dark hues of pockmarked limestone plateaus and the stark white of undulating sand dunes. Its beauty, though raw, rivals the orderly environs of the carefully manicured gardens of the island's resorts.



Finding the park, a protected area that encompasses almost 20 percent of the island's landmass, is easy. Deciding on which trail to plot can be an overwhelming yet tempting task. Officially set aside as a protected area in 1997, the park foundation is now planning the construction of a Visitor's Center, which would help illuminate for the visitor the park's many natural, historic and cultural treasures.

Accompanied by the constant wind and the occasional cry of the Aruba's "prikichi" parakeet, hikers can appreciate the diversity of Aruba's native flora species with park rangers helping to point out examples of Aruba's 48 different types of native trees, some species of which are so scarce that they can only be found in the confines of the park.

Other discoveries can be found in the animal species that find refuge under the park system, including the "shoco," an endangered burrowing owl, and the tiny "blenchi" hummingbird.

Leisurely adventure is found in the 20 miles of walking trails that have already been blazed through the park and take travelers past the island's most interesting sites. Suggested trails include the Miralamar trail (translating literally as Sea View) as it is a place where you can appreciate Aruba from all sides, with views of the sea on both the north and southern coasts, and with the trail also leading past the remains of an old gold mine.

Other highlights include the picturesque Cunucu Arikok trail that leads visitors on a stroll past a hundred-plus year old "Cas di Torto" adobe home (one of only three examples of which still exist on the island) as well as huge tonalite boulders on which can be found Indian rock drawings.

Similar Aruban rock drawings can be found on the roof of the Fontein cave, the trail to which also leads to the Fontein plantation, site of a fresh water pond and the original weekend refuge for the island's early Dutch Lieutenant Governors.

Rangers are regularly stationed at different locations, including the Fontein cave, ready to explain the attraction for the curious visitor. Intrepid travelers can recharge at the snack shop found along the road to the Fontein cave.

Arikok National Park includes a number of important and diverse natural and historical areas including:

Arikok Center, the mid-section of the park with access possible from the main road through Santa Cruz, is an area that features the Arikok hilltop, which at 184.5 meters above sea level, is the second highest point in Aruba. The area also features examples of early Native Aruban art and artifacts, and domestic and farm facilities (traditional "cunucu" (countryside) houses and "cas di torto" mud-covered homesteads). The island's only fresh water source found here facilitated plantation farming of coconuts, aloe and fruit - with the remains of the Prins Plantation and the still-functioning Fontein Plantation as visual reminders of early agriculture. Fontein cave, which contains clear indications of Indian rock drawings, is also found in this area. Jamanota Center, located south of the Arikok Center includes the highest hilltop in Aruba (Jamanota at 189 meters), and the remains of an old gold mining operation at Miralamar.

The park is also home to other important natural areas including the beach cove of Dos Playa located on the coast of the island's windward side, south of which are the caves of Quadirikiri and Huliba (Tunnel of Love).

ARUBA OSTRICH FARM

Located on the road to the Natural Bridge by the Bushiribana Gold Mill Ruins, this five-hectare large ostrich farm provides an educational experience with an incubator-cum-hospital on site. BUTTERFLY FARM

J. E. Irausquin Blvd. Home to 32 different species of butterflies from around the world, visitors have the opportunity to appreciate and learn more about these fanciful winged creatures. Guided tours are given of this real working farm, where butterflies are raised from egg to caterpillar to chrysalis to butterfly. Open every day, 9am to 4:30pm. BUBALI BIRD SANCTUARY

Or Bubali Plas, is an official nature preserve. This fresh water lagoon is located not far from the hotel strip and represents an important nesting site for the Blue Heron, Green Heron, Cattle Egret and the Snowy Egret. A tower, located just at the edge of the cattail marsh, across from the Mill Resort, offers a vantage point for viewing a variety of different bird species year round, especially during late fall when the birds migrate to the South.

DONKEY SANCTUARY ARUBA

Once the island's main mode of transportation, donkeys are now cared for at the St. Lucia-based sanctuary by "Salba Nos Buriconan" (Save Our Donkeys) Foundation volunteers. The quaint environment of corrals offers a tranquil environment to

spend the day, hear interesting facts on the island's donkey population from the on-duty volunteer, feed the donkeys or even enjoy a short ride. The non-profit sanctuary relies on the support of its volunteers and the generosity of the general public. Entrance is free but donations are highly appreciated. The sanctuary is open daily, Monday through Friday from 9am to noon, and on weekends from 10am to 3pm. For more information contact Desiree Eldering at Tel: (297) 584-1063 or Cell: (297) 568-4091.



TERN ISLANDS

Terns, also known as sea swallows can be found in breeding colonies along the reef inlets near the Valero Energy Corporation in San Nicolas. Seven different terns, including the Royal Tern, the Sandwich Tern, the Cayenne Tern, Common Tern and the Least Tern, can be found in this area.

Other birding locations on Aruba include the saltpans at Palm Beach and Malmok, the California lighthouse, Tierra del Sol Golf Course, Spanish Lagoon and, of course, Arikok National Park. Both resident and migratory species are abundant but, as one would expect, water birds are some of the most plentiful on the island. Dainty sandpipers, dashing along the shoreline feasting on brine flies and other small insects, can be appreciated as can the sight of pelicans sitting together in small flocks. Aruba represents an important refuge for these birds, in particular for the brown pelican, which is found on all of the ABC islands, but is known only to breed consistently on Aruba. More colorful native species include the Yellow Oriole (Trupial) and the Barica Geel (Banaquit). Aruba is also home to birds of prey - the Kinikini (falcon) and the Warawara (vulture). The island's most ubiquitous inland bird species include the Mofi (Black-faced Grassquit), Chuchubi (Tropical Mockingbird) and the Totolica (Common Ground Dove).





Sea Turtle Nesting Season: Four species of sea turtles, the leatherback, green turtle, hawksbill and loggerhead, nest on Aruba each year, March through September. Aruba, as a member of WIDECAST (Wider Caribbean Sea Turtle Network), compiles data and works to protect nests and hatchlings. For more information, contact Tel: (297) 582-0400.

HISTORICAL HOMES AND **CULTURAL SITES**

ARUBA HISTORY

Aruba's earliest inhabitants came to the island from the South American mainland. in small vessels, about 4,000 years ago.

These first Indians were hunters and gatherers who lived in small, scattered groups. The crop-growing Caquetio Indians of the Arawak tribe, many of whose artifacts can be seen in Aruban museums today, arrived about 1,000 A.D. and settled in three large villages on the island.

The first European to land on Aruban shores was the Spanish explorer Alonso de Ojeda, who is thought to have arrived about 1499. The Spanish had exported the Indians to Hispaniola and put them to work in the copper mines, although many later drifted back to work in the island's cattle- and horse-

breeding industries. During the years that followed, ownership of the island changed hands several times. In 1636, near the culmination of the Eighty Years War between Spain and Holland, the Dutch took possession and remained in control for nearly two centuries. In 1805, during the Napoleonic Wars, the English briefly took over the island, but it was returned to Dutch control in 1816.

CITY HALL (STADHUIS)

Erected between 1922-1925, it was the former home and professional residence of Doctor Eloy Arends. In 1986, the property was purchased by the government and was later restored to its former glory. The salon of the house is where civil wedding ceremonies are carried out. The stadhuis is connected to the former Hotel Colombia, which forms the island's census and civil registry offices.

FORT ZOUTMAN AND WILLEM III TOWER

The fort is the island's oldest surviving historical structure, built in 1796. The fort was named after Johan Arnold Zoutman, a rear admiral in the Fourth English War in which the English were

forced to retreat in August 1781. The former Dutch stronghold is now home to the Aruba Historical Museum.

ART GALLERIES

Interpretations of modern times as well as Aruba's past can be appreciated through the eyes of the island's artists. The works of a vibrant, local art community can be viewed at numerous galleries:

ISLAND INDUSTRIES

In 1824, gold was discovered on Aruba. The mines were worked for nearly a century, but by 1914 they had become unprofitable and mining was discontinued. Then, in the mid 1920's, two oil refineries began operations on the island, and soon the new "black gold" had helped give Aruba one of the highest standards of living in the Caribbean. One refinery, the Eagle Oil Company, was closed in the 1950's. Exxon closed the other refinery, the Lago Oil & Transport Company, in 1985, but it was reopened by the Coastal Corporation in 1991 and as of 2004 is run by Valero Energy Corporation.

After the refineries came the tourists: first by cruise ship, then to the island's new luxury hotels and resorts. Today, Aruba has 30 hotels, along with dozens of restaurants, clubs and casinos, and tourism has long since replaced oil as the major industry. While today tourism remains the island's largest industry, it is not its only endeavor. Tours of different island industries are currently available.

DESALINATION PLANT TOUR

The island's renowned high quality water is distilled at the world's second largest desalination facility. Discover the process from the first step of the filtering of seawater through coral beds to constant quality testing at the lab on a free tour of the Water and Electricity Bureau (WEB), located in Balashi. 
The smooth seas of the south and west coasts are perfect for both beginners and experienced skiers. Jet skis are restricted to certain areas.

Weddings and Honeymoons

WEDDINGS AND HONEYMOONS

Aruba's romantic environment of sunset-lit beaches and private beach coves has long endeared the island as a honeymoon destination. Now both the celebration of the honeymoon as well as the actual wedding ceremony and reception can also take place on the island. As one of the hot spots for both weddings and honeymoons in the Caribbean, couples seeking romance in Aruba find they come away with their fair share of memorable moments to accompany the wedding and honeymoon photos that will soon be carefully pasted in the albums back home.

Civil marriages are performed in the salon of the historic City Hall building in downtown Oranjestad. (A virtual tour of the City Hall building is available through aruba.com). After the legal marriage, couples may also wish to enjoy a religious ceremony, either in one of Aruba's churches or synagogues, or even with a blessing held right on the beach.

Visitors wishing to carry out their civil marriage in Aruba must provide an "apostille" report (a statistical search from the Bureau of Vital Statistics proving that both are single) from their country of citizenship. If either party has been divorced, he or she must submit a copy of the divorce decree; if one has been widowed, a death certificate must be produced. 





Aruba Facts



CURRENCY

The official currency of Aruba is the Aruban florin, which is divided into 100 cents. Silver coins are in denominations of 5, 10, 25 and 50 cents, one florin and 5 florins. The 50-cent and 5-florin coins, which are square, are probably Aruba's best-known coins.

The florin fluctuates with the dollar on the world market. Current exchange rates are Afl. 1.78 to the U.S. dollar and Afl. 1.34 to the Canadian dollar. U.S. dollars are widely accepted in Aruba, and banks may exchange other foreign currency. Please call or stop by the individual banks, such as Aruba Bank, Banco di Caribe, Caribbean Mercantile Bank or RBTT for further information.

Banking hours Monday through Friday, 9am to 4pm. The Caribbean Mercantile Bank branch at the airport is open daily from 8am to 4pm, except on official holidays.

ATM machines Travelers with ATM cards bearing the CIRRUS or Plus System network logos can withdraw cash in U.S. dollars (at some locations) or Aruban florins. Home bank accounts will be debited in dollars at a favorable exchange rate, and a service charge will apply. Before departing for Aruba, it's important to verify whether your PIN number will work in Aruba by calling 1-800-4-CIRRUS or 1-800-THE-PLUS.

ATM machines are available throughout the island.

Money transfer Western Union Money Transfer Service offers fast, secure and convenient money transfer service to more

than 60 countries. For more information, please call Tel: (297) 582-4400.

COMMUNICATION

Telephone If you are calling Aruba from abroad, the area code and country code is (297). If you are calling abroad from Aruba, there are a number of options for making international telephone calls: hotel operators, Setar Teleshop offices at locations including: Palm Beach, in front of the Hyatt Regency Aruba Resort; Strada Complex II, at the beginning of the main street in Oranjestad; and Royal Plaza.

Telegraph offices in the Post Office buildings in Oranjestad and San Nicolas.

Telephone booths throughout the island with a phone card, available at the Setar Teleshops and at most refreshment centers, gas stations and retail stores.

Cellular If you plan to rent a cellular phone in Aruba, contact ICRENT: Tel: (297) 583-8607; fax (297) 838-630; e-mail: ICRARUBA@hotmail.com. Cellular phones are also available through the Telecommunications Company of Setar N.V.: Tel: (297) 582-0005, and through Arubafastphone.com

Internet cafes E-mail and Internet access is possible through several of the island's Internet cafes found in locations downtown and near the hotel section. Several hotels also offer access to the Internet through their business centers.

DRINKING WATER

Aruba has pure, refreshing water, distilled in the world's second largest saltwater purification plant. Water is safe to drink direct from the tap.

ELECTRICITY

The electrical voltage is 110 A.C. (60 cycles), the same as in the United States

PETS

No pets from South and Central America are allowed. Otherwise, dogs and cats are permitted entry to the island when accompanied by a valid rabies and health certificate issued by a recognized veterinarian. Pets are not allowed at most hotels, however, so please check in advance with your hotel to ask about its policy.

POSTAGE STAMPS

As of January 1986, the island has its own postage stamps. Collectors can subscribe for new issues in person or by writing to Philatelic Service, Post Office, Oranjestad, Aruba. Tel: (297) 582-1900, fax (297) 582-7930.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES

Visitors to Aruba are welcome at all religious services. The Anglican, Baha'i Faith, Baptist, Catholic, Church of Christ, Dutch Reformed, Evangelical, Jewish, Jehovah's Witness, Methodist and Seventh-Day Adventist faiths all hold services on the island. Please ask your hotel for more information, or check directly with the church or synagogue.

TIME

Aruba is on Atlantic Standard Time, which is the same as Eastern Daylight Savings Time except that it is effective year-round.


TIPPING

A service charge of 10% to 15% is usually included in your bill. A tip of 10% to 20% is appreciated depending on the service you received.

WHAT TO WEAR

For the most part, casual, informal summer clothing is the rule in Aruba. Women may want to bring along a scarf or hat; the constant trade winds, while refreshing, are not compatible with a carefully arranged hair style.

You'll need to bring a couple of dressier outfits for visits to the island's elegant restaurants, nightclubs and casinos. As for bathing suits, please remember that they're acceptable only on the beach, and not on the streets or in restaurants.
